#### **TUNING THE GUITAR**

The standard tuning on guitars is **E-A-D-G-B-E**. Before starting, ensure you're in tune! A clip-on tuner or the free tuner on my app are safe choices. **The tuner on my app is always free**, even if you don't subscribe.



#### **READING CHORD DIAGRAMS**

You need to know how to read chord boxes to learn new grips. It's the standard way to read and write guitar chords!

The horizontal lines represent the frets (the metal bars on your guitar's fretboard). You should aim to place your finger just behind the fret, not in the middle between the frets.


The number inside each dot tells you which finger to use and where!





The six vertical lines represent the strings. The line on the right is STRING 1 and will be the string lowest to the ground if you play right-handed. The line on the left is STRING 6 - the string closest to your face.


#### **CHORD SHAPES - G**

While these chords are pretty standard for any beginner guitarist, there are a few variations of the G chord that you might like to experiment with. They all work - so find the shape that feels and sounds best for you!











## CHORD SHAPES - C


We can often substitute the C chord with a Cadd9 chord. It works great with the 'rock G' because the change between them is super simple. Still, it won't always work - so use your ears to decide!






#### **CHORD SHAPES - D**


Wherever you see a D chord in this book, you can usually play a D7. Sometimes, I suggest it where it sounds really well, but try it out and see what you think. You can also simplify D7 to a regular D if you prefer the sound or if it's easier.





#### **CHORD SHAPES - E MINOR**

Last but not least, you need Em. This is a very easy chord, and you just need two fingers - use either 2 and 3 (recommended) or 1 and 2 if you find it easier!



#### **CHANGING THE KEY 01: USING A CAPO**

If you find the key of a song is not working for your vocal range, try using a capo. Clamp it onto your guitar neck, and you play the same chord shapes - but they will sound higher. Again, you'll find a lesson on "how to use a capo" on justinguitar.com/capo.

#### **CHANGING THE KEY 02: NASHVILLE STYLE!**

Another trick you might like to try is changing the keys using the Nashville system - where chords are given numbers related to their key. They're usually written as Roman Numerals, but for simplicity's sake, we'll just use regular numbers.

In this book, all the songs are in the key of G, meaning: the **G chord** is the **1**, the **C chord** is the **4** and the **D chord** is the **5**.

In the key of C: The 1 will be a **C**, The **4** will be an **F**, and The **5** will be a **G**.

You can also use the chart below to transpose (change keys) each song, which means using easy open chords for some but needing barre chords for others. See why a capo is the easiest?:)





#### **EXTRA CHORDS**

We couldn't play some of these songs using just four chords, so you will need to explore other grips. As your ability and confidence grow, you might want to play more complicated songs. Still, I recommend learning new chords as needed instead of trying to learn as many as possible - a very common beginner mistake!





#### **STRUMMING**

To start, strum once where there is a chord, then strum the same chord each time there is a /. Keeping a solid rhythm is more important than anything else! Try to hold a solid strumming, even if the chords get a bit wonky! As you feel confident, you can add more strums and experiment with other patterns.


#### **VAMPING**


"Vamping" is when you stay on one chord for a bit! It works really well when having a sing-along with your loved ones. Just stay on the one chord, but **keep the rhythm going**. If you stop, people may think it's over - but if you keep the rhythm going, they're more likely to stay engaged.



#### **SONG FACTS**

Traditionally sung on New Years' Eve, this folk song was written by Scottish legend Robert Burns in 1788. Auld Lang Syne loosely translates as 'old times.' As such, the tune acknowledges days and people from our past! It bids farewell to the old year before welcoming in the year to come.

Good King Wenceslas was the king of Bohemia in the 10th century. The Feast of Stephen is celebrated on December 26, which is why this song is sung at Christmas time.



#### **SONG FACTS**

"The First Nowell" is a traditional English carol, most likely from the 16th or 17th century, but possibly dating from as early as the 13th century! It appeared in Christmas Carols, Ancient and Modern (1833), edited by William Sandys.

#### **SONG FACTS**

**This song has a very unusual structure!** Although each verse adds on to the next, the melody and chord structure doesn't lock into place until verse 6:

- Start with verse 1
- · Add verses 2, 3, and 4 by staying on G7 for the extra lyrics
- Once you get to **FIVE GOLD RINGS**, the melody and chords of verses 2, 3 & 4 change watch out!
- From verse 6, you hold each of the later counts (7, 8, 9, etc.) over a G7 chord and then finish up with the same chords and lyrics as verse 6.

It's insane how complicated it is. I'm as surprised as you!
